ELIJAH'S PLEA

If you read the life of Elijah through, you will see that whenever he takes a step it is preceded by, "the word of the LORD came unto Elijah the Tishbite." He never acts of himself; God is at his back. He moves according to the divine will, and he speaks according to the divine teaching; and he pleads this with the Most High, "I have done all these things at thy word; now let it be known that it is so."

It makes the character of Elijah stand out, not as an example of reckless daring, but as the example of a man of sound mind. Faith in God is true wisdom; childlike confidence in the word of God is the highest form of common-sense. To believe him that cannot lie, and trust in him that cannot fail, is a kind of wisdom that none but fools will laugh at. The wisest of men must concur in the opinion that it is always best to place your reliance where it will certainly be justified, and always best to believe that which cannot possibly be false.

Elijah had so believed, and acted on his belief, and now he naturally expects to be justified in what he has done. An ambassador never dreams that his authorized acts will be repudiated by his king. If a man acts as your agent and does your bidding, the responsibility of his acts lies with you, and you must back him up. It were, indeed, an atrocious thing to send a servant on an errand, and, when he faithfully performed it to the letter, to repudiate your sending him. It is not so with God. If we will only so trust him as to do as he bids us, he will never fail us; but he will see us through, though earth and hell should stand in the way. It may not be today, nor tomorrow, but as surely as the Lord liveth, the time shall come when he that trusted him shall have joy of his confidence.





"It is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful."

1 Corinthians 4:2

I. God Is Perfectly Faithful

- A. In the Old Testament (Deut. 7:9)
- B. In the New Testament (1 Cor. 1:9)
- C. To us personally (Heb. 10:22–23; 1 Thess. 5:24; 1 Cor. 10:13; 1 John 1:9; Lam. 3:23)

Belief affects behavior; behavior reflects belief. Our view of God determines our view of life. The Word of God constantly underscores a primary attribute of God: His faithfulness. Both Old and New Testament alike underscore God's faithfulness as the basis for our relationship with Him. God is faithful to His Word, His purposes, and His people. He is absolutely and perfectly faithful. He is trustworthy, dependable, reliable, steadfast, unwavering, and loyal!

II. God Expects Us to Be Faithful

- A. Faithfulness is the standard by which men initially enter the ministry. (1 Tim. 1:12; 2 Tim. 2:2)
- B. Faithfulness is the standard by which ministers will eventually be judged by Christ. (1 Cor. 4:2; cf. 1 Pet. 5:4; Heb. 13:17)

In New Testament days the steward (Greek, *oikonomos*) was the household manager. The pastor is clearly "the steward of God" (Titus 1:7). He is the household manager serving the Lord's interest in His church while He is away.

Faithful ministers are sorely needed today in Christian enterprise. God wants men of integrity, ethics, and industry who will carry out the assigned task with energy, enthusiasm, and endurance. He desires servants to invest all their Godgiven resources to make gain for God. He wants His managers to turn a spiritual profit for the kingdom and glory of God. He wants men as managers who are reliable, dependable, trustworthy, and faithful.

III. God Illustrates Faithfulness in Luke's Parables

- A. Luke 12:42–48 teaches that one who is faithful must be active. He must stay with the assigned task. "Blessed is that servant, whom his lord when he cometh shall find so doing." (12:43) "For unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall be much required." (12:48b)
- B. Luke 16:1–12 teaches that one who is faithful must be attentive.
 - 1. Faithfulness in small matters is the basis for greater opportunity in larger matters (16:10). "He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much."
 - 2. Faithfulness in the management of temporal money is the basis for receiving true spiritual riches (16:11). "If therefore ye have not been faithful in the unrighteous mammon who will commit to your trust true riches?"
 - 3. Faithfulness in others' matters is the basis for acquiring opportunity for managing personal assets (16:12). "And if ye have not been faithful in that which is another man's, who shall give you that which is your own?"
- C. Luke 19:12–27 teaches that faithfulness means being productive.

"Well, thou good servant: because thou hast been faithful in a very little, have thou authority over ten cities" (17); "five cities" (18–19). "For I say unto you, 'That unto everyone one which hath shall be given; and from him that hath not, even that he hath shall be taken away from him." (26)

Regarding Christians and Culture

"I have given them Your word; and the world has hated them because they are not of the world, just as I am not of the world. ¹⁵ I do not ask You to take them out of the world, but to keep them from the evil one. ¹⁶ They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world." (John 17:14–16, NASB)

I. What is culture?

- A. T. S. Elliot's
- B. "Culture is that complex whole which includes knowledge, belief, art, morals, law, custom, and any other capabilities and habits acquired by man as a member of society." What does it NOT include? Kenneth Myers, p. 27
- C. Kenneth Myers says that culture and religion are two aspects of the same thing.
- D. Culture is defined by the values of a society and the application of those values to all aspects of life. These values would include what is good and evil, beautiful and ugly, desirable and undesirable, valuable and worthless, what it loves and what it hates. These values become a culture's benchmarks or standards by which everything in the culture is judged.
- E. There are three value systems developed in most cultures that are somewhat outside of moral values.
 - 1. Folk culture
 - 2. High culture
 - 3. Popular culture

II. Is there such thing as a Christian culture? Romans 12:1–2

- A. This would be the application of the values of Christianity to all aspects of life and ministry. We have renewed minds and transformed lives. Our view of the world is totally different than those without Christ.
 - 1. This is not just an intellectual reality.
 - 2. This is, and must be, a supernatural reality produced by submission to the Spirit. A carnal Christian can be ignorant of a biblical culture as he makes his case for what he likes in the general culture.
- B. Traditional culture and Christian culture are not synonymous.
- C. Conservative culture and Christian culture are not synonymous.

III. How do we live in two cultures at the same time? John 17:14-16


- A. Christians are required by Christ to live in the culture.
- B. Cultural interaction is not avoidable for believers.
 - 1. Isolation is not possible because it is not the will of Christ.
 - 2. Cultural interaction is beneficial because it constantly requires us to think through the core issues of our faith.
 - 3. True believers have historically understood this.
- C. Christians must not be defined by the culture. That is because we are substantially different from the culture that surrounds us.
 - 1. Christians are not "of" the culture that we inhabit.
 - 2. Being hated by the present culture is the expected condition of believers.
 - Jesus prayed that we would be kept from the evil of the culture.
 - 4. Present culture is focused upon this age.
 - 5. Present culture denies God or creates a god to its own liking.
 - 6. Present culture seeks a level of popular conformity; Christians are required to be Christ-like.


- D. The Bible gives us adequate revelation to answer our cultural questions. John 17:17
 - 1. We do not need outside philosophers or non-Christian thinkers to determine our response or role in the culture. This would also indicate the danger of market research of the lost in determining our worship practices.
 - 2. A spiritual walk is required for a Christian to biblically evaluate culture.
 - 3. This requires salvation and the presence of the spirit.
 - 4. Transformed thinking is essential.
 - a. That thinking cannot be jaded by sinful habits or a selfish walk. Think Demas.
 - b. The doctrine of the sufficiency of scripture (2 Tim. 3:16) was penned when Paul was in prison in Rome.
- E. Christians impact the culture by their presence and the consistent choices they make in the culture regarding biblical ethics.
 - 1. The Great Commission is our purpose in this age, not cultural redemption.
 - 2. Cultural change is a by-product of effective Great Commission activity.
 - 3. This does not mean that Christians should not live out their faith consistently in their culture which would include voting and political engagement.
 - 4. This does not mean that Christians should not practice biblical apologetics regarding salvation, scripture, and the moral outworking of their faith.
